

Summary

The Secret Garden is a story about a young girl called Mary Lennox. She grew up in India where she was given everything she needed from servants, but she was not shown love from her parents. When they died, she moved to live with her uncle in England.

Through her new experiences she learns to love nature and spends a lot of time in his secret garden. When she finds her cousin and helps him feel better, she finally becomes part of a loving family.

Context

The Secret Garden was written by Frances Hodgson Burnett and published when she was 19 years old. It was first published in an American magazine before becoming a book. The Secret Garden is one of Burnett's most famous books and has been rewritten many times, as well as becoming a film. The Secret Garden is known as a classic English children's book, meaning that even though it was written a long time ago people will always enjoy and appreciate the story.

Questions based on the book cover


Activity 1: Front Cover Analysis

Label the front cover looking for:

- Its main features
- Genre clues
- Inferences about the text
- What does the title tell us about the story? Who are the main characters and what do you think they will be like?
- Who wrote the book?
- Mary looks happy on the front cover. Do you think she has always been a happy girl?

Activity 2: Back Cover Analysis

- What have you learnt already about the story?
- What genre do you think the book is? Why do you think this?
- How do you think Mary felt when she moved in with her uncle? Do you think her feelings changed when she found the secret garden? What clues does the text give us about this?





Challenge: Design your own secret garden. What would be inside it and how would it make you feel? Draw, collage, sculpt or build your garden.







Key Themes



Activity: As you read the story, collect examples for each theme on a post-it note and add them to a working wall.

Loneliness

Mary spent her life in India living with servants and no friends. She didn't know her family and was not sad when they died. She then moved into a manor house with her uncle, where lots of doors were closed and she was told to stay alone in her bedroom. She didn't see her uncle or cousin for a long time as they stayed alone in their bedrooms.

Friendship

At the start of the story Mary has no friends. However, over time she learns to make friends and develops friendship with many characters, encouraging them to become friends as well. Mary teaches her uncle and cousin about the importance of friendship and love.

The Power of Thought

Colin, Mary's cousin, was a sick young boy. He could not walk and was in a wheelchair. Everybody believed he was unwell. However, after spending time with Mary, in the secret garden, and seeing how beautiful life could be, he began to walk and returned to full health.





Post-Read Discussion

'Mary, without you, none of this would have happened. This garden belongs to our family, and now we are your family,' said Mr Craven.
















